# COUNTRY MUSIC: 'There's no one like Patsy' / C1 Clearing the air Tobacco scion speaks out about the dangers of smoking

he grandson of the man who created America's second largest tobacco company stunned his family in 1986 when he began speaking out against the dangers of smoking.

Talk about ingratitude. After all, Patrick Reynolds inherited \$2.5 million from his grandfather - company namesake R.J. Reynolds - when the young man turned 21 in 1969. And he made a ton of money 10 years later when he sold all his stock in the company that churns out billions of Winston and Camel cigarettes every year.

But Patrick Reynolds knew cigarette smoking had killed his father and brother. A smoker himself since his teens, Reynolds tried for five long years to kick the habit until finally succeeding in 1985, a year before he began speaking out on how he believes his family business has killed millions of peo-

Reynolds will tell his story on July 14 at the Mission Inn in Howey-in-the-Hills as a fundraising speaker during the Florida D.A.R.E Officers

Association's annual conference. "When my grandfather began manufacturing cigarettes at the turn of the century, he did not know that smoking causes lung disease, heart disease and cancer," Reynolds said. "Now that this has been absolutely proven, I want to help people wake up to how addictive and poisonous cigarettes are."

The conference is called "Keeping Our Kids Safe" and Reynolds has a strong message and strong credibility," Florida D.A.R.E President Frederick Jones said

"He is big-time, anti-smoking," he said. "He has been on CNN and Fox News. He's even been on the Senate floor."

Lake County Sheriff's Office Master Deputy Terry Allen, the group's treasurer, said he invited Reynolds to speak after watch-

"I actually saw him on CNN and he had such a story that I looked him up online and called him," Allen said. "And we worked it out for him to come to the conference."
